- Will incarcerated individuals or their families have an opportunity to submit information or supporting materials during the review process?
- What timeline is anticipated for the review of cases if this legislation is enacted?

Our intention in raising these questions is not to oppose efforts to address non-unanimous jury convictions, but rather to better understand how the proposed system will ensure fair and meaningful review for those affected.

Families like mine have lived with the consequences of these convictions for many years. For that reason, clarity and transparency in any review process are deeply important to us.

Thank you for your time and consideration, and for your continued service to the people of Louisiana.
